The Earth is our common property not separated from you and me, and there is no excuse in procrastinating any green measures to save our adorable planet.




YE 2011 interview

It is time to recruit new blood for UNICEF Young Envoys! The Young Envoys Programme 2011 has received over 700 applications from secondary schools all over Hong Kong. Two rounds of interviews were arranged for shortlisted applicants on 13 and 20 Nov 2010 at Youth Square and head office of Hong Kong Committee for UNICEF (HKCU). YEC members were involved for both interviews.

For the first interview, some of us formed the panel of judges together with HKCU staff, while some others served as receptionists. Council members and working partners of HKCU were invited to be iudges for the second interview. 60 successful applicants were then selected to be potential Young Envoys 2011. Children's Rights Forum

On 19 Nov 2010, the Children's Rights Forum was successfully held by the Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau. UNICEF was invited to take part in this forum and five of our members attended it. The forum focused on West Kowloon Cultural District Stage 2 Public Engagement Exercise and a Public Consultation of the Review of the Personal Data (Privacy) Ordinance. We have been very involved in the forum and have raised a few questions on issues such as the culture of minorities, on youth participation, etc. Our opinions were acknowledged by the representatives and were given with informative and detailed feedback. Through this forum, we have achieved our motto this year, to "Voice it Out, Pass it on!"
